Dr. Anoshua Chaudhuri

Professor and current Chair of the Department of Economics

Dr. Anoshua Chaudhuri, Professor and Chair of Economics, has received several competitive research awards, and she has collaborated with colleagues domestically and internationally, in economics and inter-related disciplines. These honors include being an inaugural ADVANCE Transforms Scholarship Hub Fellow, themed for Equitable Collaboration in STEM (2021-2022), a Certificate of Honor from the San Francisco Small Business Commission (2021), the Jerry Eisman Award for Engaged Scholarship (2021), and being named an **Institute** of Civic and Community Engagement (ICCE) Faculty Fellow (2021).



Dr. Chaudhuri's collaborative research for Disaster Preparedness of Vulnerable Populations was named <u>Best Practice</u> by the <u>American Association of State</u> <u>Colleges and Universities (AASCU)</u> and the prestigious <u>CSU Blue Ribbon Award for Community Based Research</u>. She has held leadership positions in economics associations and conference steering committees. She has published numerous peer-reviewed articles and has also written economic impact reports for several local government and non-government agencies.

Dr. Anoshua Chaudhuri's expertise impacts the lives of people from wide-ranging backgrounds and we are proud to feature her in our SFSU Transforms Faculty Spotlight.

What guided you to an academic career?

I had so many trailblazers in my family that there was no question that I would get a terminal degree in my chosen line. I was debating between medical

Transforms Celebrates Faculty at the Building Bridges Reception co-sponsored by CEETL and the STS Hub

Transforms co-hosted a CEETL event with the STS Hub to celebrate Professors Julietta Hua and Kasturi Ray's (WGS) new book *Spent Behind the Wheel* (2022). Drs Hua and Ray are alumna of campus scholarship Hubs. Faculty and Graduate Students met to talk about ways to integrate scholarship and teaching, as well as the challenges of producing scholarship at a teaching intensive university. Presentation focused on faculty ambitions for connection and how to strengthen one's teaching and student experiences through writing and intellectual engagement.



Julietta Hua, Professor of Women and Gender Studies

is the co-author of Spent Behind the Wheel and the author of Trafficking Women's Human Rights (MN Press, 2012). Her teaching and research focus on immigration legal histories, politics and race. She is currently serving as board president of San Francisco SafeHouse, a "housing first" organization that serves women experiencing sexual violence and exploitation.

Kasturi Ray, Professor of Women and Gender Studies is the co-author of Spent Behind the Wheel and the author of work on picture brides and other domestic workers. Her teaching and research focus on labor, culture, and race. She is also a Faculty Director at the Center for Equity and Excellence in Teaching and Learning.

Spent Behind the Wheel traces the ways traditional taxis and the gigged driving sector have more commonalities than differences. Both share the presumption of, and ground their profits in, unfettered access to drivers' reproductive labor. Drivers, the co-authors find, work to support the social reproduction, or full life-flourishing of others, at the expense of their own life chances. However, the masculinized bodies of drivers occlude the reproductive nature of their work, and along with it, the ways that the siphoning of drivers' reproductive capacities structures industry accumulation across the taxi and gigged sectors. and other professions and seeing how long it took to become a doctor and the hard family life, I chose Economics. The irony is that it took me a similar amount of time to get a PhD in Economics. I went to the top school in India for my masters degree and moved to the US to complete my PhD. In the PhD program, there really wasn't much exposure to industry jobs and our training was focused on an academic career.

How would you describe your recent scholarship?

SF State has shaped my recent scholarship. I started out as an Economist interested in Health and Development issues. I taught health economics regularly and development economics whenever there was a need. I realized along the way that I needed more resources than I could amass to continue in the development field. The barriers were funding to do field research and go to conferences. Hence, I started thinking about how I could integrate teaching, scholarship and service, and ICCE at that time provided me exposure to CBPR (Community-**Based Participatory Research)** and I have not looked back.

Who/What inspired you to pursue your work?

My PhD advisors, <u>Anil Deolalikar</u> and <u>Elaina Rose</u>, and [at SFSU] <u>Jerry Eisman</u>. Dr. Deolalikar is a development economist. His research was always very practical, something that spoke

to policy making. Dr. Rose believed in me and taught me critical skills. They taught me that research needs to make a difference. It's not just for academic curiosity. It should have an impact. Dr. Eisman is the reason that I stayed at SFSU.

What advice that you would give to women and nonbinary students interested in academic careers in STEM (or your field/s of study)?

Believe in yourself, fight to legitimize your research even if folks question the validity and discipline appropriateness—the sky's the limit in how you imagine your work and its importance to society and your community. No one can tell you that this work is not important.

Wow! This is inspiring! How do you do it?

I take mentoring very seriously. I've supervised many projects. Prior to becoming Department Chair, I used to have three different graduate student groups out in the community. Once, I had four groups of three students each, a total of twelve students who did four different projects. It takes so much coordination! Even with teaching my CSL course once a semester as part of our three-course teaching load, maintaining publications and being a productive member in the Economics Department, I have been able to survive and continue when it comes to research. I have published journal articles even while I've been department chair.

So, I just say that you have to believe in yourself, have great conviction—that your work is important. You have to have the passion for it. The responses from all involved with each and every report have been amazing, and all of my [CBPR] and CSL] partners always came back. That was the marker for me: that they value this work. As Department Chair, I now teach this CSL course every other year, yet I still actively mentor student research in support of the San Francisco community. For example, the report, "Impact of COVID-19 on Small Businesses in San Francisco," received the Certificate of Honor from the Small Business Commission in 2021.

How do you mark success for yourself?

For all the challenges that I have faced, pivoted, etc., to be at SF State, I appreciate and love this campus for its students. I have never encountered such a bright, engaged and grateful group of students as those we teach at SF State. I measure success by the impact that I can have on their lives, through a class well taught, a servicelearning project supervised, an opportunity to mentor and teach, being able to co-author, write recommendations and references and anyway I can elevate and transform the lives of my students.

I took on being department chair for that one purpose of putting students at the front and center of our work. My work as department chair is guided by the principle that students are who we serve and our curriculum and policies should be student-focused. I also measure success by the impact of my scholarship on the community around me. Much of my work is done pro-bono but the nature of the work energizes and rejuvenates me.

Anoshua Chaudhuri is a Professor and the current Chair of the Department of Economics in the Lam Family College of Business at San Francisco State University. She received her PhD in Economics from the University of Washington, Seattle, and an MA in Economics from Delhi School of Economics. Dr. Chaudhuri's research, teaching and service scholarship is at the intersections of health, development and family economics with a focus on evaluating the impacts of policies and programs on community and household health outcomes. Dr. Chaudhuri teaches courses on Health Economics Research, Economics of Gender, and Microeconomics, and she created the first Community Service Learning (CSL) course within SFSU's Economics Department. She serves as a Board member and Vice-Chair of SF State's University Corporation and also volunteers as a Board member of a non-profit mental health agency, Richmond Area Multi-services (RAMS). Dr. Chaudhuri has published her research in numerous peerreviewed journals such as Economic Development and Cultural Change, Social Science and Medicine, Health Policy, Journal of Family and Economic Issues, Children and Youth Services Review and Journal of Cross-cultural Gerontology.

We have learned of several college-wide efforts to engage in anti-racism and racial justice at SF State. Here are a couple of highlights. In the College of Health and Social Science,

Valerie Francisco-Menchavez, associate professor in the Department of Sociology & Sexuality Studies, has been appointed to the newly created post of assistant dean for restorative and transformative racial justice. The position was created as part of the CHSS Reflections and Actions to Create Equity (RACE) Initiative and reports directly to the dean and RACE Collective (the leadership of the RACE Initiative). She will begin in the role starting Spring 2023 when she returns from a sabbatical.

In the College of Science and Engineering, a committee co-led by Transforms Co-Investigators Drs Diane Harris and Petra Dekens has culminated in a Racial Equity report on the college.

In the College of Liberal and Creative Arts, a committee is focusing on Equity and Leadership Development. The LCA professional development program is committed to providing the opportunities and space for all faculty and staff to thrive as scholars/artists, teachers, professionals and colleagues at all stages of their careers and in alignment with the core values of the college and institution. In Faculty Affairs and OSRP

Finally, you may have noticed that ORSP has institutionalized the **Campus Equity Scholarship Hub**, a faculty hub for Associate level faculty who identify as Black, Indigenous, and Women of Color. The campus equity hub was co-developed by Juliette Hua, Dawn-Elissa Fischer and Laura Mamo and was supported in 2021-2022 by ORSP and Faculty Affairs. A Cohort of 6 faculty fellows were led by two co-leads as scholars moved their

work forward and prepared for promotion to full. The campus equity hub is now part of the RSCA application and is available for Associate level TT faculty seeking connection in a cohort model for exchange, support, and collaboration. We will continue to refine the equity hub model and ensure its continuation.

We are grateful to ORSP and Faculty Affairs for recognizing the value of the equity hub model and working with us to institutionalize the effort for our campus community.
